The Mark Benevolent Fund was founded in 1868 and is the official charity of the Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons, the third largest branch of Freemasonry.

The Fund comprises of twelve Trustees who in turn form the two committees who review applications:

 The Petitions Committee who assess applications from individual Mark Master Masons or their dependants who may be

in distress.

 The Worthy Causes Committee which looks at applications from registered charities and other worth while organisations.


